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

## SECTION 4: First aid measures

### 4.1. Description of first aid measures

### 4.3. Indication of any immediate medical attention and special treatment needed

Note to physician- Eyes: If pain persists, repeat washing for 15 minutes or until pH of eye returns to normal. If great pain persists, place one (1) drop Benoxinate solution (0.4%) in the affected eye.

## SECTION 5: Firefighting measures

### 5.1. Extinguishing media

Suitable extinguishing media : Water spray. Alcohol-resistant foam. Carbon dioxide. Dry chemical.

### 5.2. Special hazards arising from the substance or mixture

Fire hazard : Flammable liquid and vapor. Irritating fumes of hydrogen chloride and organic acid vapors may develop when material is exposed to water or open flame.

### 5.3. Advice for firefighters

Firefighting instructions : Use water spray to cool exposed surfaces. Exercise caution when fighting any chemical fire.

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Protection during firefighting : Do not enter fire area without proper protective equipment, including respiratory protection. Avoid all eye and skin contact and do not breathe vapor and mist.
